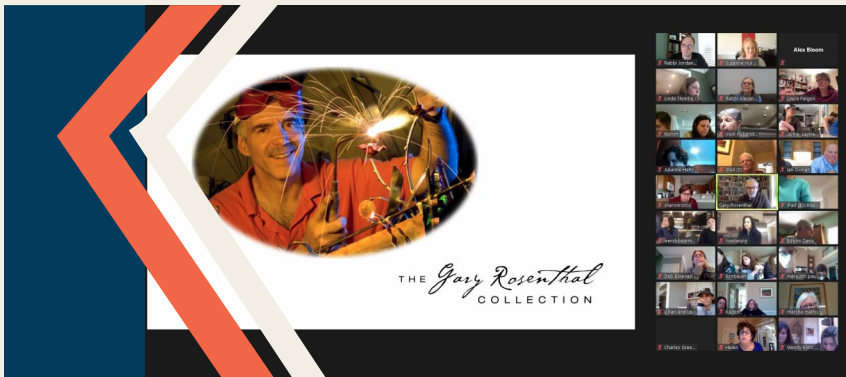

Making Jewish Places grants specifically focus on organizations and individuals that are creating radically welcoming spaces, engaging people where they already live, and connecting Jews and their loved ones to build meaningful social connections to create a more vibrant and welcoming Jewish Community.



Organizational Microgrant Highlight

Mezuzah Creation Project with Gary Rosenthal

Congregation Dor Tamid and Temple Beth Tikvah’s wanted to encourage their congregations to include more Jewish symbols and art in their homes, including having a mezuzah adorn their front door, if they did not already. They partnered together, along with artist Gary Rosenthal, and participated in his *Hiddur Mitzvah* program. *Hiddur mitzvah*, is a commandment to make things beautiful while doing good. We think that all Jewish ritual pieces required in mitzvot should be as aesthetically pleasing as possible in order to glorify G-d and his commandments.

- 230 “screens” participated, most with multiple people on each screen.
- Appealed to a wide audience as it was open to all ages and to affiliated and unaffiliated.

Zehavit participated in MJP's \$125 Purim celebration microgrant. Zehavit lives in Johns Creek with her husband and three boys. Zehavit owns an Israeli inspired organic baking company, Baking Smiles. She invited four other Jewish women in her neighborhood and asked them each to bring a Jewish friend. There were nine women total, as well as herself. She taught them how to make different flavors of hamantaschen to take home to their families. They enjoyed an evening of cooking, friendship, and learned about the strong women of Purim. Many new friendships were made because of this program!

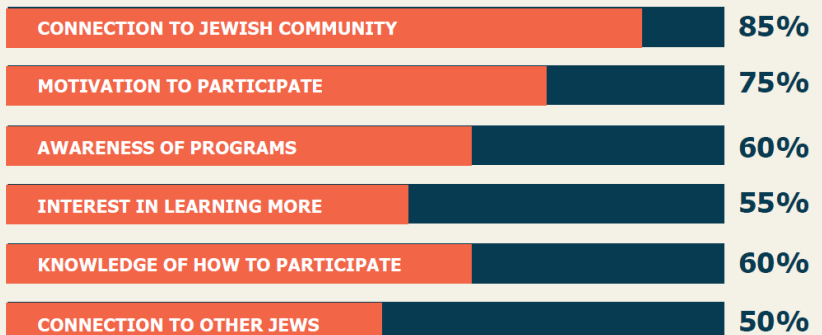
